

The Season of Lent

The English word "Lent" is a shortened form of the Old English word "lencten," meaning "spring season." Lent is traditionally described as lasting forty days, in commemoration of the forty days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness before beginning his earthly ministry. Sundays are excluded when counting the forty days of Lent because they are each considered "little Easters." The season of Lent was originally established in the fourth century to prepare those who were to be baptized on Easter Sunday. It was a time of study and examination to deepen their understanding of their baptismal vows. Today it continues to be a meaningful time of preparation and renewal, a time for self-examination, acts of mercy and intentional spiritual practices such as daily prayer and bible readings, as we anticipate the coming joy of Easter.

How To Use This Resource

This booklet is designed to be used for individual devotional time or as a discussion guide for small groups interested in following a six-week Lenten practice.

The Lectionary Scripture Readings for the season of Lent (Year B) are listed on page 2. You may read all the passages listed for a particular week or choose to focus on one passage which you return to throughout the week.

Beginning on page 3, you will find writings, quotes and scriptures divided into six chapters, one for each week of Lent. Each chapter focuses on one aspect of Jesus' self-giving, sacrificial acts on our behalf.

May the daily reading of these reflections bring you a sense of renewal, hope and joy.

WEEK ONE

Jesus Christ - God With Us

WEEK TWO

Jesus Christ - Our Ransom

Jesus said,

"The Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many."

Mark 10:45

The God who promised, through the great Old Testament prophets, to visit and redeem his people, did precisely that through coming to dwell among us in Jesus.

God entered into our situation in order to transform it.

Far from demanding that we raise ourselves to heaven, he came down from heaven in order to bring us there himself.

You were ransomed

Ransom - what is the meaning for us? Consider this image: there are some people in captivity and they cannot break free. Unless someone is able to liberate them, they will remain trapped.

A ransom price is demanded by their captors.

The greater the value of those captured, the greater the value of the ransom demanded.

The Christian Gospel is clear on this point:

God showed the amazing depth of his love for us by paying an astonishing, unsurpassable ransom for each of us.

Alister McGrath: Redemption

Those who passed by derided him, saying,

"Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days,
save yourself and come down from the cross!"

In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes,
were also mocking him, saying,

"Come down from the cross and save yourself!" (Mark 15: 29-31)

Here is the point:

the crowds called upon Christ to come down from the cross and save himself. But he chose not to. He stayed there and saved us instead.

Alister McGrath: Redemption

I can do nothing to earn my salvation.

My redemption is a pure gift of grace,
a gift offered to me without qualification or reservation.

I am God's beloved, embraced in God's love for now and eternity.

All words are inadequate to describe
the extravagance of this wondrous gift of salvation.

God our Savior desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God; there is also one Mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all. I Timothy 2:3-6

Hanging from the cross,

Jesus first speaks to his Father about forgiveness,
quotes from Psalm 22, addresses his mother,
addresses the thief on the cross,
then makes his first self-referential remark,
"I thirst."

These stark words force us to reckon with the reality that Jesus is in the flesh. His suffering is real.
